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11	<u>§ 1267.01 Fire Safety Survey</u>
12	(a) On or before July 1, 2021, and every five years thereafter,
13	the board, in consultation with the State Fire Marshal, shall
14	survey local governments, including counties, cities, and fire
15	districts, to identify existing subdivisions without an adequate
16	secondary egress route in all SRA or LRA mapped as a very high
17	fire hazard severity zone.
18	(i) An adequate secondary egress route is a road, navigable
19	by class one vehicles as defined by the Federal Highway
20	Administration, of equal construction standard to the primary
21	road (e.g., two paved roads). The secondary road does not have
22	to be rated to carry the same quantity of traffic (e.g., a two-
23	lane paved road and a one-lane paved road is acceptable).
24	(ii) An adequate secondary egress route is not:
25	(A) <u>a road with locked gates or limited access; or</u>

1	(B) a road that directs traffic to the same outlet
2	road as the primary road or results in a circular
3	traffic flow, to the extent practicable.
4	(b) Local government officials, including elected officials,
5	fire officials, or representatives of agencies that govern land
6	use planning and subdivision design, may request the board and
7	the State Fire Marshal survey specific subdivisions in their
