OAL hereby returns the rulemaking record your agency submitted for review regarding "14 CCR Section 1052.1 Non-Substantive Amendments."

If this is an approved matter, it contains a copy of the regulation(s) stamped "ENDORSED APPROVED" by the Office of Administrative Law and "ENDORSED FILED" by the Secretary of State. The effective date of an approved regulation is specified on the Form 400 (see item B.5). **Beginning January 1, 2013**, unless an exemption applies, Government Code section 11343.4 states the effective date of an approved regulation is determined by the date the regulation is filed with the Secretary of State (see the date the Form 400 was stamped "ENDORSED FILED" by the Secretary of State) as follows:

- (1) January 1 if the regulation or order of repeal is filed on September 1 to November 30, inclusive.
- (2) April 1 if the regulation or order of repeal is filed on December 1 to February 29, inclusive.
- (3) July 1 if the regulation or order of repeal is filed on March 1 to May 31, inclusive.
- (4) October 1 if the regulation or order of repeal is filed on June 1 to August 31, inclusive.

If an exemption concerning the effective date of the regulation approved in this matter applies, then it will be specified on the Form 400. The Notice of Approval that OAL sends to the agency will include the effective date of the regulation. The history note that will appear at the end of the regulation section in the California Code of Regulations will also include the regulation's effective date. Additionally, the effective date of the regulation will be noted on OAL's web site after OAL posts the Internet Web site link to the full text of the regulation that is received from the agency. (Gov. Code, secs. 11343 and 11344.)

<u>Please note this new requirement</u>: Unless an exemption applies, Government Code section 11343 now requires:

- 1. <u>Section 11343(c)(1)</u>: Within 15 days of OAL filing a state agency's regulation with the Secretary of State, the state agency is required to post the regulation on its Internet Web site in an easily marked and identifiable location. The state agency shall keep the regulation posted on its Internet Web site for at least six months from the date the regulation is filed with the Secretary of State.
- Section 11343(c)(2): Within five (5) days of posting its regulation on its Internet Web site, the state agency shall send to OAL the Internet Web site link of each regulation that the agency posts on its Internet Web site pursuant to section 11343(c)(1).

§ 1052. Emergency Notice

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(d) Timber Operations pursuant to an Emergency Notice may not commence for five working days, 15 days for a fuel hazard Emergency per 14 CCR §§ 1052.1(<u>ae)(5)</u> and 1052.4, from the date of the Director's receipt of the Emergency Notice unless such waiting period is waived by the Director. The Director shall determine whether the Emergency notice is complete. If it is found to be complete the Director shall send a copy of a notice of acceptance to the Timberland owner. If the Emergency Notice is not complete it shall be returned to the submitter. If the Director does not act within five working days, 15 days for a fuel hazard Emergency per 14 CCR §§ 1052.1(<u>ae)(5)</u> and 1052.4, of receipt of the Emergency Notice, Timber Operations may commence.

0 Solutions 1052.1 Emergency Conditions

(<u>a)</u> The following are conditions that constitute an Emergency pursuant to 14 CCR § 895.1:

 $\left| \frac{(1a)}{(1a)} \right|$ Trees that are dead or dying as a result of insects, disease, parasites, or animal damage.

(<u>2</u>b) Trees that are fallen, damaged, dead or dying as a result of wind, snow, freezing weather, drought, fire, flood, landslide or earthquake.

(3e) Trees that are dead or dying as a result of air or water pollution.

(4d) Cutting or removing trees required for Emergency construction or repair of roads. (5e) Where high, very high or extreme fuel hazard conditions, the combination of combustible fuel quantity, type, condition, configuration and terrain positioning, pose a significant fire threat on private Timberlands. Cutting and removal of hazardous fuels, including trees, shrubs and other woody material, is needed to eliminate the vertical and horizontal continuity of Understory fuels, Surface Fuels, and/or crown fuels, for the purpose of reducing the rate of fire spread, fire duration and intensity, and fuel ignitability.

The following are conditions that constitute a financial Emergency as defined in 14 CCR

Potential financial loss of timber previously inoperable or unmerchantable due to one or more of the following factors: access, location, condition, or timber volume that has unexpectedly become Feasible to harvest provided that the harvest opportunity will not be economically Feasible for more than 1 year and provided that such operations meet the conditions specified in 14 CCR § 1038(b)(1)-(10) and meet minimum Stocking requirements at the completion of Timber Operations.

(<u>6</u>f) An isolated infestation of Sudden Oak Death (SOD) (caused by *Phytophthora ramorum*), in the locations listed below, where such treatments are intended to
 eradicate the infestation or significantly slow the spread of the disease. For the purpose
 of this rule an isolated infestation is:

24 25 (<u>A</u>4) a<u>A</u>n infestation located in a Planning Watershed where SOD had not previously been noted; or

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1	(B2) aAn infestation located in a Planning Watershed that is greater than 1 mile
2	from a known SOD infestation; or
3	(<u>C</u> 3) a <u>A</u> new infestation within a Planning Watershed where all known previous

5	eradication efforts; or
6	(<u>D</u> 4) a <u>A</u> location where landowners seek to contain an infestation, even though
7	some landowners have not made proactive efforts within a Planning Watershed,

10	(<u>E</u> 5) An isolated infestation is limited to locations in the following counties:
