Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting for the Gallo, Delicato & Stone CalVTP

Introduction

CEQA Guidelines require public agencies “to adopt a reporting and monitoring program for changes to the project which it has adopted or made a condition of project approval to mitigate or avoid significant effects on the environment.” A mitigation monitoring and reporting program (MMRP) is required for approval of the proposed project outlined in the PSA. Standard Project Requirements (SPRs) and Mitigation measures (MMs), which are part of the program description, outlined in the CalVTP PEIR, have been adopted. These SPRs and MMs have been designed to avoid or mitigate significant environmental effects which were identified in the PEIR.

Roles and Responsibilities

The project proponent (Northern Sonoma County Fire Protection District) is responsible for taking all actions necessary to implement the SPRs and MMs described in this document. The project proponent is responsible for administration of the project, including timing of mitigations, monitoring, and all project requirements. The CEQA lead agency (Northern Sonoma County Fire Protection District), will be responsible for verification of all mitigations and monitoring efforts.

Reporting

The project proponent will document the compliance of the proposed project with the required SPRs and mitigation measures either by adapting the project-specific MMRP table or preparing a separate post-project implementation report.
